Eugenia Lake is fishing fun for the whole family. The main species of fish that can be caught include Rock and Largemouth Bass, Perch, Sunfish, and Bullhead Catfish. Caution: Keep back from buoys surrounding hydro dam.

Lake Eugenia

Lake Eugenia is considered to be the "Hidden Gem of Grey County." Located in the Village of Eugenia, the lake is an hour and a half away from Toronto and just minutes north of Flesherton. The lake was created in 1915 as a reservoir for a hydro-electric dam built on the Beaver River. The largest inland lake in Grey County, Eugenia has an irregular shoreline and a central island that are great for exploring by canoe, kayak or paddle board. After your paddle, relax with a picnic at the beach or go for a swim. Motorized vessels must stay 30 metres away from shore. Eugenia Lake access is located at the public beach just off Canrobert Street, east of the Beaver Valley Road (Grey Road 13). A fee applies if you use the dock area to launch your canoe; most paddlers set off from the beach. The lake can be hazardous in high winds. O.P.P. patrol the lake waters, especially on holiday weekends.
